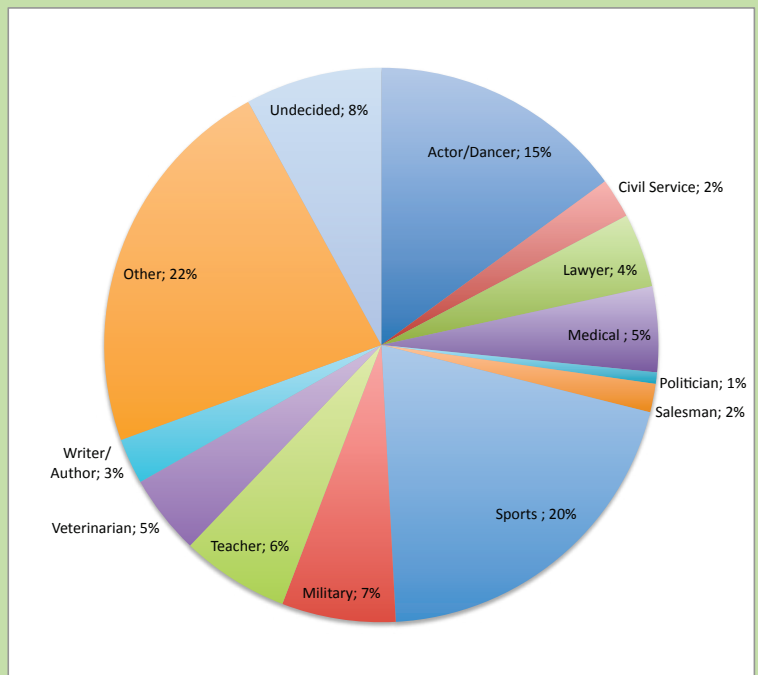
POLL RESULTS

Food Allergy Awareness Week

I interviewed Claire Campos.

What are some things you can tell us about Food Allergy Awareness Week?

C: This year Food Allergy Awareness Week was from May 8th to May 14th. It is supposed to develop an awareness about food allergies to people who don't know that much about it.



How much money was raised?

C: About \$270 was raised.

What kind of allergies are people not aware of?

C: Some people don't know as much about allergies as others, or what an epi-pen is. The second part of the English test has you write some short answers, an essay, and only a few multiple-choice questions. For the part two tests, there are usually about 10-20 questions. The state tests don't count as part of your grade. They help determine if you'll need extra help the next year, if your right-on target, or if you're exceeding past the target.

Tennis is a sport that originated in the UK in the 1900's and is still popular today with the French

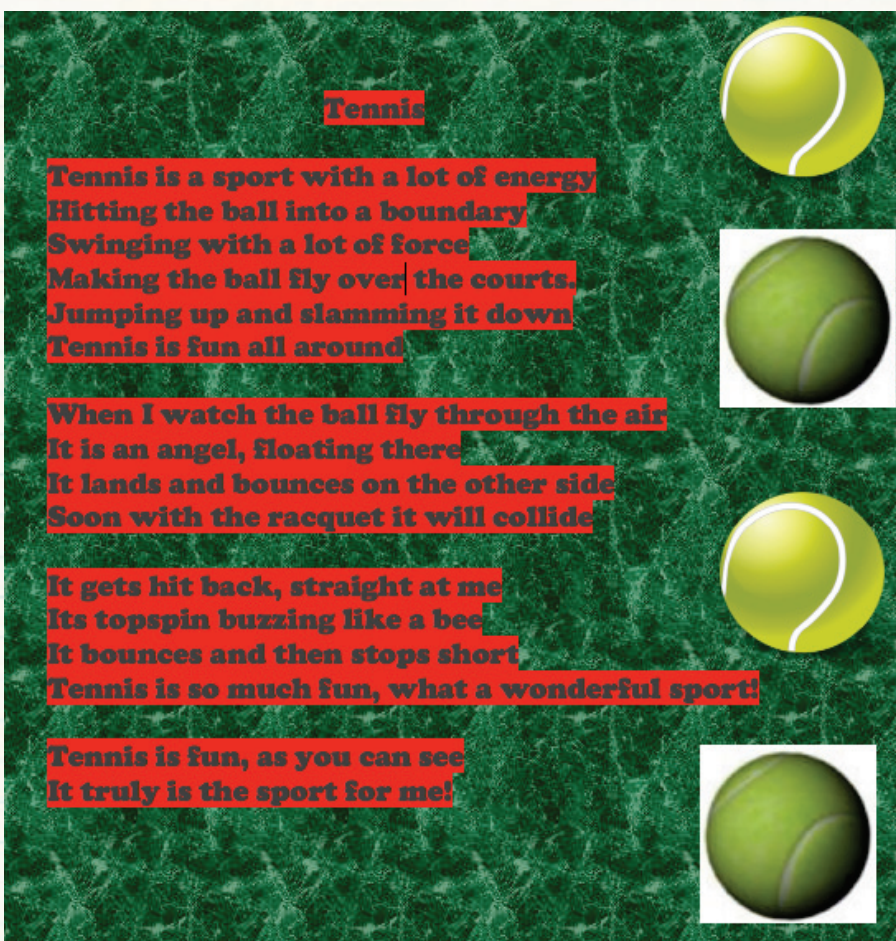

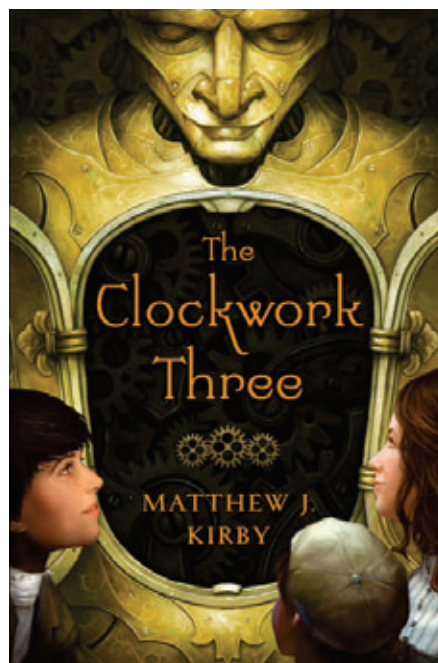
