



An important piece of advise is to respect yourself and value your identity. If you feel you are not being respected while online, he suggests that we **Stop**, **Block**, **and Tell**. Save the evidence too!

Think before you speak. Some sites capture audio and video and what is captured may come back to haunt you. Identity theft is a big problem. People may not be who

they say they are.

The bottom line is to not "friend" people you don't really know, especially if they are older than you. Facebook opens you up to predators. Meeting new people is not a good thing to do on Facebook, and don't accept gifts from people. Look for patterns when you are online playing video games to see who you are playing with; do you know them or not. Mr. Grimes said that if you are a victim once, you are more likely to be harassed again. 75% of the victims are girls and 99% of the predators are boys. 

Thursday, April 26th was Pay it Forward Day.






POLL RESULTS



Easter in India is celebrated much differently than in the U.S.A. For example, there is no decorating

already decorated Easter eggs and give them to their children. Worshippers are in church all day for special prayer. A lot of people go to Goa, a major Easter destination in India. There are songs and

dances, and a colorful carnival is there during the Easter season. Delicious Easter cakes are baked for loved ones.

In France, there are no Easter bunnies. Instead, there are Easter fish. The Easter fish are called Poisson



d' Avril which means "April Fish." On April first, as an April fool joke children stick Easter fish on as many adults as possible.



"Flying bells" are an important Easter tradition in France. On Good Friday, it is believed that all the church bells in France fly to Rome carrying the sorrow and misery of

those who mourn Jesus's death. But on Easter day all the bells are believed to return and bring lots of chocolate. Poland has some really cool Easter traditions too. For one thing, they do something called a

"Blessing Basket." On the Saturday before Easter a basket is filled with colored eggs, bread, cake, salt, paper and white colored sausages. Then the full basket is taken to the church



to be blessed. It is believed that Lent is not over until the basket has been blessed. Having an Easter breakfast is considered an important tradition in Poland. Each person at

the breakfast table wishes everyone luck and happiness. The table is decorated with green leaves and a lamb made out of sugar is placed in the center. Smoking is not permitted.



Warm meals are served. It may sound funny,



but sharing a boiled egg blessed by a priest, with salt and pepper and with a family member is considered another important Easter tradition.

Wow! Very different countries, *very* different traditions. If you're taking a vacation to another country, you might want to go around Easter season. Who knows, maybe you may want to keep that new Easter tradition and make it your own!

Easter Celebrated in Hungary

The Easter Rabbit is a symbol of Easter. But why? The answer is that in some German traditions, an Easter hare brings Easter eggs. The rabbit used to be a dog, until the rabbit was decided as a better animal for the holiday, or church tradition. The tradition of the Easter Bunny was brought to America in the 1700s by German immigrants who settled in Pennsylvania. Children made nests where the 'rabbit' would lay its eggs. Later, these nests were replaced by decorated baskets. Eggs are put in these baskets, as a symbol of Jesus resurrection. The reason for this 'egg laving rabbit' is that eggs are a symbol of fertility and that rabbits usually multiply man times. There are no references to the Easter Bunny in the bible, but it has long been an adopted Christian tradition. Later, the eggs became chocolate in the U.S. There is no reason for these chocolate eggs, other than a huge profit from companies such as Cadsbury. Because of all these profits, chocolate eggs have become an American tradition.



I researched a couple of countries and how they celebrate Easter, Hungary really stuck out. Hungary is a very religious country. For Easter Sunday, the church is held in the morning. Women spring clean their homes and bake traditional Easter pastries. People of the church carry a statue of Christ and banners in a procession through the parish, singing appropriate hymns. They even celebrate Easter Monday and refer to as Ducking Monday. Boys sprinkle girls with perfume or perfume water, and wish each other good luck. The girls have to reward the boys who sprayed them. They give them coins or Easter eggs. Easter Monday is also a day of hospitality when visitors are welcome, Easter greetings are exchanged and guests are served traditional Easter pastries and small glasses of apricot or plum brandy. Eggs in Hungary are decorated with red flowers on a white ground.
