Phillipsburg Manor Field Trip



Frankenstein Cake

Mr. Carlin: Our class started our Plant Unit in the Fall. We planted grass seeds and now we are growing beans and peas that we had hoped to use the greenhouse this winter to house the plants.

Us: What is your goal with these plants?

Mr. Carlin: According to the Scientific Method, our problem is, "Will the bean plants survive in the greenhouse throughout the winter with only using solar heat and water?"

Us: Mr. Carlin, what is your hypothesis?

Mr. Carlin: I had thought that the greenhouse would be able to do this, but I am afraid that we will have to reject our hypothesis,. The greenhouse does not produce enough heat to keep the plants alive during the cold season.

We are going to look into purchasing some type of solar panels that will provide a system to keep the greenhouse warm in the winter. We are in the beginning stages of researching now. If there is anyone reading this who has ideas on how we can do this we would love to hear from them.

Gingerbread

Christmas is coming up, and traditionally, some of you might bake gingerbread with your family! But have you ever wondered how and when gingerbread was created? Now, sit down with some hot chocolate and gingerbread. It all started long ago...

In ancient times, an early form of gingerbread first made its appearance in Greece and Egypt. And guess what? The Greeks and Egyptians didn't actually eat the gingerbread! They used it for ceremonial purposes!

Gingerbread traveled over to Europe when 11th century crusaders brought the spice (ginger) back from the Middle East for the wealthy folks' cooks to experiment with.

At first, ginger was very rare and expensive. But then, as the spices became more affordable, gingerbread became more popular! An early European recipe consisted of ground almonds, stale breadcrumbs, rose water, sugar, and, of course, ginger. Our recipes today usually contain ginger, sometimes cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, and cardamom and anise. It's always sweetened with any combination of brown sugar, molasses, light or dark corn syrup, or honey!

The gingerbread batter used to be pressed into wooden molds- not cookie cutters! And these molds weren't just plain circles. They were wonderfully, carved works of art that served as a sort of storyboard that told the news of the day.

The finished cookie might be decorated with creamy white icing, and edible gold paint (For those who could afford it!) to bring out the details.

In the 16th century, the English changed their gingerbread recipe quite a bit (a lot like ours today!) They replaced the stale breadcrumbs with flour, and added eggs and sweeteners to the mix. At fairs, gingerbread tied with ribbon was popular - and when exchanged, became a token of love! On a more practical note, before refrigeration even existed, crumbled gingerbread was added to recipes to mask the stench of decaying meat.

The History of Candy Corn

Candy Corn is a popular Halloween candy with its remarkable white tip, orange center and yellow bottom. Candy corn is over 100 years old and was invented by George Renninger, an employee of the Wunderlee Candy Company in the 1880's. The Wunderlee Candy Company was the first to produce Candy Corn and was later made by the Goelitz Candy Company in the 1900's, which is now the Jelly Belly Candy Company. When Candy Corn appeared in America, people thought it was revolutionary to have a three-color design. America was full of farmers at the time and they probably found the candy corn charming or just that the people liked it. The lack of machinery meant that candy corn was made in August to the end of fall. Candy corn in the 1900's was just a mixture of corn syrup, sugar and several other ingredients. Fondant and marshmallows were added to give a softer texture and bite to them. The mixture was then poured into kernel-indented cornstarch trays. Workers walked backward pouring different colored mixtures to give the tri color design. Once finished,

the sweets were delivered by wagon in tubs, cartons and wooden boxes. Today, the system is very similar but machines make it rather than people. Rather than pouring the colored mixtures, mellowcremes, partially set white candy. The orange and yellow mellowcremes are added later. Once cooled, the candy corn is covered in confectioners glaze to make them shiny and then packed and shipped. Even thought candy corn is from the 1880's, it is delicious among people of all ages.

Halloween History




