iTeam








Geometry in 5th Grade

HoverCam®

There is a new and popular camera that we use here at PVMS called the HoverCam®. There are three main versions: The Solo 5, the Solo 8, and the Neo 3. The HoverCam is a document scanner. Ji Shen is the CEO and inventor of the HoverCam. Some teachers around the school use HoverCams. Mrs. Stein, a 6th grade ELA/AIS teacher uses a HoverCam in her classes. We asked her some questions about the camera.



Q: How long have you had the camera?

A: Since October of 2015

Q: Do you think the camera is useful in the classroom?

A: I do; I think it enables the kids to see work that is theirs or is going to be theirs. It's great for modeling to show the students what they can do... also it can zoom in like a magnifying glass.

Q: Any general comments about the HoverCam?

A: I love it! I also use it to create videos to show other teachers how I grade student work; if they want to grade similarly.

Mrs. Stein uses a Solo 8 while Mrs. Sherwood uses a Neo 3, Solo 8, etc.

Clearly, HoverCams help teachers and students alike.

- *to look up the definition of a word, select the word t and press the Cmd + Ctrl + D keys*






Mrs. Weyn

Donald Trump 36%


Ted Cruz 5%


