Red Ribbon Week is celebrated here at Putnam Valley Middle School (PVMS) and is celebrated across the nation. Red Ribbon Week started in 1988 to honor the D.E.A Agent Enrique Camarena. The D.E.A. is the Drug Enforcement Administration. An incident that helped start Red Ribbon Week was in February of 1985: Agent Enrique Camarena was kidnapped and killed in Mexico. Camarena was thirty-seven years old when he uncovered a multi billion-dollar drug scam in which he had suspected officers of the Mexican army, Mexican police forces, and the Mexican government to be selling drugs. When he was exiting his office one day five men kidnapped him. One month later he was found tortured, beaten and dead in a grave. People honor him because he was undercover and risking his life to reveal a drug scam. He was a hero for trying to prevent people from doing drugs.

The U.S. Congress declared Red Ribbon Week in honor and support for Agent Enrique Camarena. Red Ribbon Week at PVMS is celebrated by dressing up on every day of the week as seen below. On Monday morning we all received bracelets that state "Say Peace Out To Drugs" on one side and, "I'll Pass" * "No Thanks" * "Drugs Aren't Cool" on the other. Also, as you may not know, throughout the day Mrs. Castrillon, our PVMS guidance counselor, had been judging people and giving out daily prizes to whoever had the most creative costumes. There were many winners.

Mrs. Castrillon suggests that Red Ribbon Week should be turned into Red Ribbon Month, but she fears that that would interrupt the students learning experience. Mrs. Castrillon feels that the way PVMS celebrates Red Riboon Week is good because we make it fun for students. "That makes students want to take part of Red Ribbon Week", said Mrs. Castrillon. Other programs that teach us about drugs is the "All Stars" program. Mrs. Castrillon feels that that is a good curriculum to teach about leading a healthy life without drugs. Make good choices!
