Earthquakes

Earthquakes are ranked at different levels. A weak earthquake would rank a 1.0 and a strong earthquake would rank a 9.0. Scientists figure this out by using a Richter Scale. Charles Richter created this machine in 1935. If an earthquake measures 3.5 or less it is barely felt but recorded. Earthquakes measuring 3.5-5.4 can be felt but doesn't usually cause damage unless the nation has really poor structured buildings. Under 6, on the Richter Scale, causes damage. 6.1-6.9 can cause damage spreading to a range of 62.14 miles.

There was recently an earthquake in Haiti. This earthquale ranked a 7 on the Richter Scale. CNN reports that 212,000 people were killed in this earthquake. There are many people and organizations trying to raise money for Haiti. There is an organization

called "Hope for Haiti". They give 96% percent of the donations to the poorest of the poor in Haiti. The people in Haiti have it the worst because they are on an island so it's hard for planes to land there to help them. There was also an earthquake in Chile recently. It ranked an 8.8 on the Richter Scale. Buildings were destroyed and people were left with nothing. 2,000,000 people were affected by this earthquake. Earthquakes ruin a lot if they have a high rating on the Rich-



ter Scale. Since it is such a high rating it will cause a lot of damage on a wide range of land. Because the earth's plates are always shifting, earthquakes can occur at any time and as a result, can cause a lot of damage anywhere on the earth.
