This means to nearly achieve success, but not quite. This idiom started because a long time ago, people were given cigars as a prize at carnivals. Today, prizes consist of stuffed animals. Did you know that Odin, the Norse god of storms, was often pictured with dogs and wolves, which were symbols of wind? Also, witches, who supposedly rode their brooms during storms, were often pictured with black cats, which became signs of heavy rain for sailors. Therefore, "raining cats and dogs" may refer to a storm with wind (dogs) and heavy rain (cats).
